
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Centralized Registration

 - Military Housing Letter



Kindergarten Transition

Starting school is an exciting time for families and teachers. The transition to Kindergarten may also feel overwhelming. There are many skills to learn: how to share, be a good listener, function in a group setting with classroom rules and expectations, and much more. There are also social skills necessary for students to learn in order to become successful. Students will learn to take turns, persevere, practice generosity, and embrace differences. Many of these concepts take time for children to learn, but by introducing these concepts to children while they are young, families and teachers prepare children for their future. As children carry these skills in the future, they will become prepared for various social settings.

Children begin Kindergarten with a wide range of abilities and readiness, both in academic and social skills. Teachers are prepared for the wide range of readiness in their classroom; however, the more prepared a child can be for the first day of school, the more confident and enjoyable the child's experience may be in school. To help a child prepare, families may support children as they practice and develop important academic and social skills before entering Kindergarten. Use the list of skills below a as a guideline:

Kindergarten Readiness Academic and Social Skills:

- Identify all uppercase and lowercase letters presented in random order
- Say the sound of each letter of the alphabet
- Identify pairs of pictures that rhyme
- Write his or her name
- Draw and identify basic shapes: circle, square, triangle, etc.
- Correctly name 6 or more colors
- Identify numbers 0-20 presented in random order
- Count a set of objects up to 20
- Use the restroom independently
- Use child-safe scissors to cut across a page
- Eat independently
- Share toys with peers
- Take turns in a game with others
- Sit quietly and calmly while someone is reading or talking for 10 minutes
- Work independently on a classroom task for 10 minutes

These skills represent what Kindergarten teachers would like to see when they start Kindergarten in order to make the transition smoother. Don't be alarmed if your child doesn't have all of the abilities before beginning Kindergarten. Children's skills are continually evolving.

Kindergarten teachers are prepared to support your child progress at his or her own pace. The tips below provide ways to support for your child before school begins.

Tips for Supporting Your Children's Transition to Kindergarten:



Spend a few minutes per day working on specific skills at home. For example, teach your child to identify the first letter in his or her name. Support your child in locating the letter in a book. Encourage your child to find the letter within his or

her everyday environment (at the grocery store, in the neighborhood, at preschool, etc.). Have your child trace the letter with his or her finger or build the letters using clay or play-doh. Continue teaching each letter in the child's name. Work on shape identification by helping your child notice circles in his or her environment.

- Schedule a visit at your child's school before school begins. Talk to the Kindergarten
 Transition Teacher and principal about any specific needs or challenges (strengths and
 weaknesses) your child has and how they can be addressed. Ask questions about the field trips
 and school events your family may look forward to for the school year.
- If your child feels apprehensive about attending a new school, discuss their concerns.
 Validate your child's feelings by listening to their worries, but encourage them to focus on the new positive experiences they'll have in Kindergarten.
- Read to your child for 10-15 minutes everyday. As you read, pause to discuss what is going on in the story. Rhyming books, alphabet books, and number books will help your child practice more academic skills.
- Practice noticing colors by playing games. Show your child an object that is red. Encourage your child to find other things in his or her environment that are red.

What can we do???

- Be willing to actively participate in the process.
- Respond to communication from your child's teacher in a timely manner in the spirit of collaboration.
- Take ownership for your child's behavior.
- Offer assistance to your student's teacher or team. Not all tasks require a physical presence on school premises.
- Read all communication from administrators and central office with an open mind to receive the information that is being communicated.
- Realize that even in a transparent organization, not all stakeholders can be part of the decision-making process.
- Post up in the halls during morning entry, lunch and/or afternoon dismissals to provide additional adults to deter behavior issues.
- Attend planning meetings hosted by central office and administration to problem solve issues in the district.
- Join PTSA (you are the "P") at your students school to increase our voice by lobbying, supporting and contributing to the needs of our teachers and schools to government entities.


